left right at the back." My reply was, "God is good, He is looking after me." My


son's answer to that was, "No Mum. God hasn't come down to do your shopping. It's me standing here in Morrisons."



There are numerous verses in the Bible that encourage us to say 'Thanks' to God. Many of the Psalms contain verses of thanks. At one point King

David, who wrote quite a number of the Psalms, was surrounded by his enemies who wanted to kill him, yet even in that situation he was able to thank God for His faithfulness. I think that I would have just said, "H-E-L-P"!


There are a couple of verses that Paul wrote, that are rather puzzling. *Ephesians 5:20. '.....always and for everything give thanks.'* 1 Thessalonians 5:17. '....give thanks in all circumstances, for this is the will of God.....' We feel fine giving thanks to God when things are going well or when something has particularly blessed us, but, giving thanks for everything and in all circumstances is quite another matter. How can we give thanks to God at times of bereavement, loss of job, lack of finance, accident or poor health issues? I think that Paul is telling us to try and be positive and to look at the good side in some of these events instead of constantly feeling sorry for ourselves and looking at the negative aspects. Bad times are not very pleasant but we can feel worse if we are forever moaning about what is happening to us. God is always there to strengthen and help us whatever our need might be at any specific time so that is a good starting point for thanks when hit by any unpleasant occurrences.

Back to the Psalms.

Psalm 107:1. 'O give thanks to the Lord for he is good, His steadfast love endures for ever.'

Over and above everything else the most important thing in our lives is to give thanks to God for the love that He has for each one of us. His love for us never changes regardless of anything that we might do or say; it is constant. His desire is that we have a close relationship with Him because that is why He created

us.



we are enabled to go to Heaven for eternity. How can we help but thank Him? How can we do anything other than thank Him for the tremendous change that He can make to our lives when we live for Him rather than purely for ourselves? It is only when we come to Jesus that we receive the ultimate satisfaction and meaning to our lives.
